## Lions

Lions symbolize power and strength, and in Spain and Spanish America, these felines represented the king and queen.

## Monkeys

Monkeys are native to various regions of Spanish America and were popular long before the arrival of the Spaniards. They were associated with the rainforest and symbolized the richness and wonders of the Americas.

## Musical Instruments

Instruments such as trumpets, lutes, and guitars help us to imagine how a particular scene may have sounded. Musical instruments accompanied dance and celebrations, and even battles and hunts.

## Leones
